Metro District vs. HOA

Understanding Our Governing Structure. New Windsor Metropolitan District is not a Home Owners' Association (HOA) - it's a special district, similar to your local fire department or library district. As a governmental entity established under [Title 32 of Colorado law](#), the district has the authority to levy taxes, issue bonds, and provide public services. We're governed by a resident-elected [Board of Directors](#) who hold public meetings and must comply with state transparency requirements. This structure allows us to fund and maintain infrastructure, enforce community standards through covenants, and provide services like water and landscaping. Unlike HOAs, metro districts operate under stricter governmental oversight and accountability standards.

Lainie Peltz. Our Neighbor and Town Board Member District 3



Lainie and Chris Peltz moved to New Windsor in 2000 with their child and later added two more to the family! The children successfully "flew the nest" and live in Georgetown, Cripple

Creek, and Chicago. "We chose New Windsor because we love the Victorian feel, colorful houses, white picket fences and lots of room for kids to play". They have watched Windsor grow from 12,000 to 48,000 in 26 years, but embrace the small-town vibe.

"How did I get to be on the Town Board? Our previous Town Board member, Ken Bennett, also lived in our neighborhood. With his encouragement I applied for a Citizen Advisory Board position and was subsequently appointed to the Parks, Recreation, and Culture Advisory Board (PreCab) in Fall 2020. Ken also encouraged me to run for his seat at the end of his term. I was elected to the Board in April 2024. Each of us are also liaisons to various Boards and I currently sit on the Great Western Trail Advisory Board (GWTA) and the Clearview Library Board of Trustees.

Recipe: Get ready for Fall! Red Chile

- 2 lbs ground beef
- 1 can rotel
- 1 can black beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can mild chili beans
- 1 jar mild roasted salsa
- 1 yellow onion, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1 package taco seasoning
- 1/3 can La Costena jalapeño peppers (optional)

In a large pot, add ground beef, crumble and cook. While cooking, add in taco seasoning onions and pepper.

Once meat is cooked, add rotel, salsa, and jalapeno peppers (add jalapeno juice for extra spice). Stir and let sit on medium/low heat.

Once getting close to serving, add in black beans, and chili beans. Stir and cover. Cook for 10-15 minutes (until beans are warm).

Top with cheese, sour cream or whatever your heart desires!

The New Windsor Board voted and appointed Glen Ross to fill the vacancy. Glen will fulfill the Board requirement of five board members as well as fulfilling the Board requirement as a member of the Design Review Committee (DRC).

From the Metro District Seasonal Home Maintenance Reminders

Neighborhood landscaping and property maintenance rules help create a safe, attractive, and well-maintained community. Although they require homeowners to meet certain standards, these rules protect property values, promote safety, and enhance the neighborhood's overall appearance.

- **Irrigation Systems:** Check sprinklers for proper coverage and repair any broken heads. Remember watering restrictions: no watering between 8am and 6pm, with assigned days based on your address.
- **Weed Control:** Treat rock areas with pre-emergent weed control regularly. Weeds in rocks, grass, or landscaping are common violations.
- **Lawn Health:** Keep grass mowed, green, and disease-free. Address dead or patchy areas promptly.
- **Tree & Shrub Care:** Prune dead branches and monitor for disease or pest damage.
- **Keep Sidewalks Clear:** Prune back tree branches and bushes to keep the public sidewalks accessible. Did you know that the Town requires that tree branches must be pruned up 7 feet?
- **Exterior Paint:** Inspect for fading, peeling, or oxidation—exterior painting requires the neighborhood Design Review Committee approval.
- **Fence Maintenance:** Repair damaged sections and ensure proper staining/painting.

Regular maintenance prevents violations and keeps our neighborhood looking its best!

Some Windsor History

The Tracks That Tied It All Together

In 1882, the Greeley, Salt Lake and Pacific Railway completed a line connecting Greeley and Fort Collins. Before the tracks arrived, Windsor farmers struggled to get their heavy grain crops to distant markets. The new railroad immediately turned the small settlement into a bustling shipping hub. Local farming became highly profitable, setting the stage for Windsor's official incorporation in 1890.



Gardening Tips

It's the height of summer, and gardens across Northern Colorado are putting on their biggest show of the year. Perennials are blooming, pollinators are busy, and everything seems to be growing at once. As much as I enjoy this season, I'm already looking ahead to my favorite time in the garden: Fall.

Fall is one of the best times to plant. Cooler temperatures and warm soil help plants establish strong root systems before winter, giving them a head start next spring.

If I could recommend just one improvement for almost any garden this fall, it would be to add structure. Take a walk through your garden beds and look for places to weave in native grasses among your flowers. Planting them about 16 inches apart creates a beautiful living matrix that ties the entire garden together.

Some of my favorite choices for our area are sedges, Blue Grama, Little Bluestem, and, where space allows, Karl Foerster Feather Reed Grass. These grasses add movement, texture, and winter interest while giving gardens the naturalistic look that has become so popular in parks and botanical gardens.

Plant a few this fall, and by next spring you'll be amazed at how much they transform your garden.
